- 6. Olympic Ideas and Values
- 7. My favourite Olympian (First years only)

Breakdown of the marking for 'Section 1' of the judging criteria:

Appropriate title	The title has no link with the PExpo categories (no title = 0)	1-3
	The title is vaguely linked to the PExpo categories	4-6
	The title is clearly linked to the PExpo group and you can see how the project is going to be developed	7-9
	The title tells you the exact nature of project	10
Appropriate aims and objectives	No aims and objectives	1-3
	The project has aims and objectives but there is no link to the title or category	4-6
	The aims and objectives are clear and a link can be seen	7-9
	The aims and objectives are clearly linked to the title	10











Appropriateness of content	The content has no clear link with the title or group	1-3
	The content is related to the title or group, but not precisely enough	4-6
	The content is linked to the title and category and demonstrates a good level of understanding	7-9
	The content is clearly linked to the title and category and shows that the project has a clear beginning, middle and end	10

TIPS AND IDEAS

Starting your project

As part of brainstorming for your PExpo project idea, you may wish to use the following prompts:

- Categories I am interested in...
- Possible research titles/questions...
- Information and key points I have researched so far are...

Once you have considered your project area, think about:

• How will I conduct the research for this project and who will help me?

Research

- Where will I find the information/materials/computer applications I need for my project?
- If conducting a survey, what questions will I ask?
- When conducting a survey, what research method will I use interview or questionnaire? Both?
- How much time will I need to conduct a survey?









Analysing data

Once you have collected information (from literature, documentaries, online resources, etc.) and have the results of your research (survey, questionnaire or interview) consider:

- How will I compare and assess the information I gathered?
- How will I display that information to best effect, possibly using graphs, bar charts and photographs?

Conclusion

Summarise your findings:



- What did you learn/enjoy from your research?
- What would you do differently?
- Would your project lend itself to further research?









GENERAL TIPS

- Use your strengths.
- Assign tasks to everyone in your group.
- Practise what you plan to say to the judges and make sure everyone knows the script.
- Don't change anything on the day.
- Do a dummy run of your display and take a picture of it so that you know where everything goes.
- Give yourself plenty of time to put up your display by arriving at least 30 minutes before judging starts.
- Make your display board colourful.
- Make your presentation flow from one part of the project to the other.
- Bring everything you think you might need with you including scissors, thumb tacks — and duct tape!
- Be approachable when the judges arrive and have an anecdote or two ready about your PExpo experience.
- Look presentable (wear your school PE kit or uniform).
- Beg, borrow and (oh better not do the last one!)
- Give yourself time to visit the other projects and stands at PExpo.
- Above all, have fun!
